
Ratio 4:5 This is a ratio, like 2 to 1 odds, etc., and should be shown as such using a colon (:) and not a hyphen (-). If the dog stands 4 inches high (at the shoulder), it should be 5 inches long, and so on, and so on. Therefore, if the dog is

8" high, it is 10" long; 12" high, it is 15" long; 16" high, it is 20" long; 20" high, it is 25" long;

So, if the dog at the top of the male standard is 22" at the shoulder, it should be 27-1/2" long. (I have never seen a Beardie 27-1/2" long no matter how tall he is!)

For that reason, I feel that if a ratio is given, it should be 4:4.5, or 4 inches high: 4-1/2 inches long, etc.

Length is measured from point of sternum (breast bone) to pin bone (rear of pelvis)—— note illustration.



Cynthia Mahigian: I was not completely able to follow Mr. Blake's rationale for not measuring at the withers. There are, of course, different references to the appropriate place to measure a dog in different standards. However, the "withers" is certainly a common (probably the most common) place to take a measurement. Moreover, it is the place called for in the Beardie standard to take the height and I, for one, can see no reason to change it. It is, after all, the consistency of a certain place that we are concerned with, not the place itself.

I'm sure Mr. Blake will explain the points of measurements as per this question, however, I think it extremely important to make a point here about his statements made at the symposium that, in his opinion, there were no dogs at the Specialty that conformed to the 4:5 ratio. First, that is an opinion. My own impression was that there were many dogs that did, in fact, conform to the ratio. Second, even supposing there were not any dogs that conformed, it does not follow that the standard is wrong. Rather, it surely indicates that the dogs themselves are not long enough to conform to what the standard calls for. We do not change the standard to fit what we

are breeding, after all; we change our breeding patterns where necessary to fit the standard. If every Bearded Collie in the US today were cowhocked, would Mr. Blake then advocate the inclusion of cow hocks as a desirable trait in our standard?

The Bearded Collie is supposed to be a long, lithe dog. There are many specific reasons that the extra length of back is desirable; one of these is the increased flexibility that a long spinal column allows. It is important to remember, however, that the extra length is to be supported by a correspondingly long ribcage and not a correspondingly long loin. It is also important to remember that the ratio is a guide, not an absolute, and serves to underscore the desirability of a dog considerably longer than tall (measured as per the standard.)
