S	9.2.1	The Diehard Agility Trophy is established to honor the highest scoring bearded collie in Excellent level agility. The trophy features an original Chet Jezierski color drawing of beardies doing agility and is imbedded in acrylic and mounted on a walnut base. Plaques attached to the base allow the names of the winners to be permanently engraved. Designed by Chet Jezierski, it is offered and financed by freewill donations from the beardie agility community. Legs earned in Excellent A and B Standard, and Excellent A and B Jumper's With Weaves (JWW) will be counted. To be eligible for this award, a beardie must earn at least three qualifying scores of 100 in Excellent Standard and JWW. The scoring system is:
		Each clean run will be awarded 1 point for every full second under Standard Course Time (SCT). In addition, each Double Q (QQ) (qualifying in both Standard and JWW on the same day) will be awarded an additional 10 points. Points will be totaled for each individual qualifying leg and QQ, and then added together to determine the dog's total score.
		If a tie in points occurs, the beardie with the highest average yards per second (YPS calculated to 0.01 seconds) in Standard and JWW will be considered the winner.
		For Standard:YPS [course length in yards/(dog's time on course – 5]For JWW:YPS [Course length in yards/dog's time on course]
		YPS will be calculated for each individual qualifying leg and the average value determined for Standard and JWW. These two averages will then be added and the dog having the highest YPS will be declared the winner. 9.2.2	Denia Trophy. An annual agility competition trophy, donated by Glenn Hamilton and Emily Venator in the name of the first bearded collie to obtain an AKC Agility title, Am/Can CH Melville's Poetry in Motion TT HIC NA CGC ADC FbDCH, is awarded annually to the bearded collie achieving the highest point total by earning titles in the standard agility classes through the MX. Only legs leading to titles will be counted. Points will be awarded based on score according to the following sliding scale: 100 = 8 99 = 7 98 = 6 95 - 97 = 5 93 - 94 = 4 90 - 92 = 3 88 - 89 = 2 85 - 87 = 1 If a tie occurs in point total, the tie breaking mechanism will be to calculate the average yps (yps = course yardage/(dog's time - 5)) for each dog's individual legs and calculate the average of these to 0.01seconds. The winner will be the dog with the higher yps average. If the dogs remained tied after this procedure has been carried out, both will be listed as winners of the award for that year. 05/11, 08/95-19
9.2.3	The Mirage Trophy for High in Jumpers With Weaves is awarded to the bearded collie with the most outstanding performance in JWW. This trophy, featuring a metal statue of Mirage performing the weave poles on a walnut base, was proposed and financed by Beth White and designed by John Stanbridge. Each year's winner will receive a statue donated by Beth White. The base will remain in the possession of the BCCA. To be eligible for this award, a beardie must earn at least 6 qualifying scores of 100 at any level of JWW (Novice, Open, or Excellent.)In Novice, Open, and Excellent A; only clean runs leading to titles will be counted. In Excellent B, all legs will be counted. The following scoring system is to be followed: A beardie will receive 5 points for each clean run and 1 point for each full second under Standard Course Time (SCT). If a tie in points occurs, the tie will be broken by calculating YPS for each of the tied dogs' individual legs and the results averaged. The winner is the beardie with the highest YPS. If, after this procedure is carried out, the average YPS for each of the tied dogs is the same, all will be declared winners of that year's award. 04/01-02, 09/01-02, 02/11-02
9.2.4	The Preferred Agility Veteran Award is sponsored by Carl Widell in memory of Cagney, the first beardie to earn Preferred Excellent agility titles. This award will go to the top veteran dog, seven years of age or older, during the entire competition year, for performance in both Standard Agility and Jumpers with Weaves. Only legs toward titles will be considered. The trophy is a rectangular plaque with a large metal plate on the left side that is laser-inscribed with the words "Bearded Collie Club of America" "Preferred Agility Veteran of the Year" topped by a stop-action image of Cagney exiting the weave poles. On the right side of the plaque are metal plates for inscribing the winners' names and years. The scoring will be based on the following sliding scale: Qualifying Score Point Value 100 = 8 99 = 7 98 = 6 95 - 97 = 5 93 - 94 = 4 90 - 92 = 3 88 - 89 = 2 85 - 87 = 1 If a tie in points occurs, the beardie with the highest average YPS (calculated to 0.01 seconds) for all Standard + JWW legs earned will be the winner. For Standard legs, YPS = STD course length/(time on course - 5). For JWW legs, YPS = STD course length/time on course. 05/06-01

9.2.5	The Ryan Awards - Jumpers with Weaves Plaques are awarded to the top bearded collies in each level of JWW. These awards were established by Beth Canner in memory of Ryan, CH Jande Hellava Knight CD HIC AGI PUP, the first beardie to obtain any type of agility title, and are sustained by an anonymous member of the Beardie agility community. In Novice A, Novice B, Open, and Excellent A, legs leading to titles will be scored, no matter the year in which they were earned. In these classes, a beardie will be eligible for a JWW award only in the year in which the title is earned. For beardies competing in Excellent B, all legs earned during the current year will be scored and there is no requirement for a title to be earned in order to be eligible for the Excellent B JWW award. Scoring: Novice A – Excellent A: The scores of the three legs leading to the title will be summed and the beardie with the highest total score will be the winner. If a tie in score occurs, YPS will be calculated (to 0.01 seconds) for each of the three title legs and the results averaged. The winner will be the beardie with the highest average YPS. If a tie remains after this calculation, all those tied will be declared the winners of the award for that year. Excellent B: A beardie will earn five points for each leg earned during the calendar year and one point for each full second under SCT. Ties in score will be broken by the YPS procedure specified above. 05/99-03
9.2.6	Award Certificates for Standard Agility. An annual award certificate is established for the top bearded collie in each level of Standard agility. In Novice A, Novice B, Open, and Excellent A, legs leading to titles will be scored, no matter the year in which they were earned. In these levels, a beardie will be eligible for the Standard award only in the year in which the title is earned. For beardies competing in Excellent B, all legs earned during the current year will be scored and there is no requirement for a title to be earned in order to be eligible for the Excellent B Standard award. Scoring: <u>Novice A - Excellent A:</u> The scores of the three legs leading to the title will be summed and the beardie with the highest total score will be the winner. If a tie in score occurs, YPS will be calculated (to 0.01 seconds) for each of the three title legs and the results averaged. The winner is the beardie with the highest average YPS. If a tie remains after this calculation, all those tied will be declared the winners of the award for that year. <u>Excellent B:</u> A beardie accrues 5 points for each leg earned during the calendar year and one point for each full second under SCT. 9.2.7	The Lightning Award rewards speed in AKC agility at the Masters' level, for the fastest average combined scores in Standard Masters or Masters Preferred and JWW Masters or Masters Preferred, during the preceding year. Preferred scores must be for a Veteran, age seven or over. The award is sponsored by Lori Weinberg to honor Rocky, MACH PACH Chaniam Creag MXS MJG MXP3 MXPB MJP7 MJPS PAX XF. The custom steel award features a shadow figure of a Bearded Collie stretched over a jump. Yards per second will be used for scoring purposes; the five fastest legs for each dog that is eligible for the award are counted; drop the high and low numbers and average the remaining three runs. Add the average for the Jumpers to the average for Standard, to get the dog's total score. The dog with the highest combined score is the winner. For example, an average jumpers yps (6.244) plus average Standard yps (5.41) equals a total score of 11.654. In the case of a tie, multiple trophies will be given.

9.4.1	Top Herding Dog – Awards. These annual awards are presented to the four dogs participating in AKC-licensed events that attain the highest overall average qualifying score (from all three qualifying runs in attaining the title and the top three qualifying runs in the case of the Championship Class) for each of the following classes: Started Class, Intermediate Class, Advanced Class, and Championship Class in keeping with any current AKC Regulations. These awards shall be presented in the year in which the titles are earned, regardless of the year in which the title is obtained. Ties shall be broken by the average of the number of dogs defeated using the first three qualifying runs under at least two different judges to obtain the title. 06/99-09, 09/99-07, 04/11-04
9.4.2	 Herding Dog of the Year Award is awarded to the first ranked bearded collie in the Started, Intermediate, and Advanced levels of the AKC Herding Trial Program each year in accordance with the current AKC Herding regulations. The ranking of each dog at each level will be calculated as follows: first, identify the three highest point counts, then take the scores associated with the highest point counts. A. Points: A dog earns one point for every dog which had a lower or non-qualifying score in the class at that Trial. High in Trial carries points equal to the total dogs in competition in that trial minus one point, instead of class points. B. Ranking: At each level, the dog's three highest point counts from three different judges will be averaged to two decimal places. If a dog has one or more identical point count(s) under different judges, the higher scores(s) will be used in the calculations.

The two averages will be added together. The dog with the highest combined average at each AKC herding level will be ranked #1, etc.
 C. Ties: Using only the three runs determined by items A and B above, ties will be broken by: The highest average placement in the classes. The highest average point count. The highest average score.
All points/scores will apply at each level in the year of completion of the title, regardless of the year earned, except that once the Advanced title has been earned, for the next and subsequent years, points and scores must be earned within each calendar year. 01/99-03
The Bishop Award for Herding Excellence shall be awarded to the bearded collie that earns the highest average points on sheep. The award will be a lead crystal "Rising Star" with Bishop's face etched in the top. There shall be a wooden base for plaques listing the winners of this award. The winner shall be announced each year in the BCCA Newsletter and Beardie Bulletin which are published immediately following publication of the March AKC Awards.
The actual award shall be presented to the winning bearded collie at the BCCA national specialty and is to be held by the winner's owner for eleven months. Each winner shall also receive an award to be retained permanently by the owner.
The BCCA herding chair shall be responsible for tabulating all qualifying scores and numbers of dogs outscored. The points shall be taken only from the official AKC Awards and shall be calculated as follows:

The three highest actual scores earned on sheep on any course at trials held within each calendar year shall be averaged to 100ths of a point; 2. The three highest actual number of dogs outscored on sheep on any course at trials held within each calendar year shall be averaged to 100ths of a point; 3. These average point counts shall be added together and the one dog with the highest point average shall be deemed the winner of the Bishop Award.
 Should a tie occur, the tie shall be broken as follows: The dog whose scores and numbers come from a higher class or classes shall be declared the winner. Should Provision (a) not break the tie, then the dog which has the most High In Trial wins throughout the calendar year shall be declared the winner. If no prospective winner has attained a high in trial win, then the number of reserve high in trial(s) or the higher average of actual class placements shall determine the winner.
The Faith Memorial Challenge Trophy is to be awarded to the bearded collie bitch with the highest combined score on sheep earned during the national herding event(s) each year until retired, using qualifying scores from A, B, or C course or any combination of these courses. The trophy, offered by Cindy Mendonca in memory of HC Artisan Starlight HXAs, is a hand-painted slice of agate mounted on wood. 02/08-01
The Boone Memorial Trophy is awarded to the bearded collie dog with the highest combined score on sheep earned during the national herding event(s) each year, using qualifying scores from A, B, or C course or any combination of these courses.
