Meeting the Challenge of the TDX

Excitement was in the April air as the first dog, Bearded Collie Ch. Cannamoor Honey Rose CD, TD, approached the flag at the New England Dog Training Club's first advanced tracking test. Conditions were ideal for tracking: little wind, cool air, a cloudy sky, and good ground cover freshened by an overnight shower. Plotted by two judges experienced with the Canadian TDX test, the track was excellent--demanding but fair. In the two months since the American TDX test had been approved, however, only four dogs had passed. Would Honey be equal to the challenge of the TDX?

After the two judges had indicated the starting flag, Honey and Virginia Parsons, her trainer and handler, were on their own. Unlike the TD Test, which has two starting flags to indicate the initial direction taken by the person walking the track, the TDX has only one. Therefore, it is entirely up to the dog to determine the direction taken by the tracklayer three hours before. Her handler could only wait while Honey circled around the flag, checking the ground in different directions. When she finally decided that the tracklayer had gone straight ahead into the open field, Honey put her nose down to follow his scent and started off, pulling into her tracking harness as her handler followed at the end of a thirty-foot line.

After making the first turn in the tracks of the tracklayer, Honey came to her second major challenge -- a crosstrack with a fresher scent left by two people walking four feet apart, who crossed the original track I I/2 hours after the person Honey was following. Although she turned her head briefly in acknowledgement of the fresher scent, she was not to be diverted and kept doggedly on after her original quarry.


Shortly after locating the tracklayer's belt, the first of three articles left directly on the track for the dog to find, Honey encountered her first obstacle; the tracklayer had left the open meadow and plunged through high, dense marsh grass. Honey was not to be deterred, however, and followed along, discovering two more turns before the trail once again emerged into the open field, where it was crossed for a second time by the two, fresh diversionary tracks. This time, Honey ignored them completely.

Through two more turns in the open field, across a paved road, over a stone wall, and into a second field, Honey tracked her quarry. More than halfway there—and then, Honey met her most difficult challenge: a plowed corn field. There was little vegetation to hold the track—layer's scent, and during the three hours since he had passed that way, it had spread out over the bare ground and settled in the furrows. Again and again, Honey had to check out this elusive, billowing scent, working slowly and patiently down the field. Suddenly, she was rewarded withthe tracklayer's scarf, her second article. Thus encouraged, she went on, picking up a stronger scent when she left the plowed field for a section of grassy ground. Unfortunately, the final corner took her back into the corn field. Once again forward progress was slow, but Honey persevered until she found the tracklayer's glove at the end of the half-mile track.

Thus, Honey had successfully followed a three-hour-old human scent trail more than 800 yards through all types of terrain and over several obstacles, had ignored a fresher diversionary double crosstrack which had intersected the original track in two widely separated places, and had found three personal articles dropped by the tracklayer along the way. In doing so, she

became the fifth dog of any breed and the first Bearded Collie to meet all of the requirements for passing the AKC Advanced Tracking Test. To date, only 16 out of 112 entrants have been equally successful.

After officiating at the NEDTC TDX test, Dorothy Budge, experienced Canadian tracking judge, commented that the AKC TDX test was more difficult than the Canadian one because of the variety of obstacles a dog and handler might encounter, each requiring specialized training. At the same time she felt such challenges make the American test more practical. Thus the advanced tracking test simulates actual working conditions and presents problems a working tracker might really encounter in searching for a fugitive or a lost child. Ch. Cannamoor Honey Rose CD, TDX overcame each one to successfully meet the challenge of the TDX.



Choosing a Puppy

The following article comes to us from the Bearded News, via the Beardie Expression (WRBCC)

After much consideration, I've decided to attempt to tell you what I personally look for when choosing a puppy as a show prospect. I hope it will be of some assistance to you in your ventures, with this, my favourite and much loved breed.

When the pups are born I have a good look at their confirmation, length of neck, back and ribcage, shoulder placement and angulation of the hindquarters, tail set and length, etc. Although I watch their development constantly, I never make my final decisions until they are about 7 or 8 weeks old. The ones which appeal from the start are often the ones I eventually choose, but as the heads begin to develop at about 4 to 5 weeks, I reserve judgement. I remember a puppy in one of my first litters which I really liked right from birth. She had a very nice head amongst other features

and my heart was set on keeping her, but when she was five weeks old her head started to change. By the time whe was 7 weeks she had a very small "snipey" muzzle, though everywhere else she was beautiful. I didn't keep her, because to me a good head is very important feature of the dog, and a poor head can spoil the whole picture.

When it comes to making up my mind, I like to sit amongst the pups for a while, until they've forgotten I'm there. I can then assess their movement, general outline and balance. Then I examine them on a table, and look for the following virtues:

A squarish skull with muzzle of roughly the same length, preferably a bit on the longer than the shorter side, with a blunt nose. The ears should be triangular viewed from the front, and set on at the corners of the skull. Eyes have usually cleared by this age, and the darker they are the better I like them. But of course the paler coated dogs, i.e., born blue, brown or the black who is going to be a light grey (this can be detected if the black has already begun to clear to grey, especially round the eyes, legs and tail) generally have a lighter eye than the dark, slate greys and blacks. The eyes should be largish but by not means bulbous.

The teeth should be a scissor bite. If they are correct at 8 weeks I don't worry if they go slightly overshot between then and 4–5 months, expecially during teething. But if they are wrong at 8 weeks, I don't take a chance on them as they don't usually come right.

The front legs must be straight and the feet tight with well-arched toes, and oval in shape. I find trimming toenails at weekly intervals from one week old until the pups are tottering, apart from being kinder to mum, helps pups to find their feet quicker, and encourages them to be tight.

The neck should be slightly arched, a little more so on a dog, and shoulder tight and laid well back. Level topline, long, deep and flat ribcage, muscular thighs with well-bend bent stifles and hocks. Taillow set and long enough to at least reach the hock.

I like a thick springy coat which is straight, and prefer it to lie flat on top of the head, rather than stick up like a powder puff, though this is usually alright when the puppy wool has been cast. It should feel harsh even at this age, and be straight. If the adult coat is going to be wavy, the puppy coat by 12 weeks will show definite signs of waviness behind the ears, on the neck and the tail.

Temperament should be bold, happy and gay. If the temperament is basically sound, but the pup is reserved with strangers and new surroundings, this can usually be overcome by taking him about with you, to the shops or a dog-minded friend's house. Also putting him the arms of "doggy" type visitors, from an early age, can produce a very sociable pup.

Well, I hope this has been of interest to you, and has perhaps given you some tips for choosing your own puppies. I wish you luck with your Beardies and hope you have the pleasure and fun of showing, as well as owning your dogs.

In My Opinion

Taboo . . . in Any other Breed

There has always existed an unwritten—but nevertheless accepted—code of ethics for breeders and exhibitors, irregardless of their specific breed. It has been rather evident since February, 1977 that many individuals breeding and exhibiting Beardies either are not aware of—or do not care about ethics.

In reference to the exhibitor, it has always been understood that "there are certain people that you ethically do not show under." Essentially, it has always been considered to be highly unethical to show your dog under its breeder or under the owner of its sire. This should not require any explanation, the reasons are obvious. In Beardies, however, it appears to be different. At the BCCA Specialties, for example, dogs have been shown under their breeder; dogs have also been shown under the owner of the sire. Theses practices began prior to 1977 and are still with us today. Does this reflect a lack of knowledge on ethics? Does this indicate a "win at all cost and to heck with ethics" attitude?

The practice of a national breed club Board member showing under another Board member has always been frowned upon. It does exist to a certain extent in some breeds, but it has always been discouraged. It is legal for a Board member to travel 500 or 1000 miles to show under another. It is legal for one to travel across the country to show a dog under another Board member who happens to be the owner of the sire. Legal, yes. The practice is, however, regarded as extremely unethical by the AKC and by exhibitors in any other breed. Such a practice is not in the best interest of the breed, the parent club, or the individual judge! There have been instances in the past in various breeds where two or more of such Board members have obtained judges' licenses. This frequently led to the "you put up my dog and I'll put up your dog" scam. Is this waiting in the wings?

Most alarming — and threatening to the existence of the breed is the lack of ethics among some breeders. Again, there has always been a certain understanding of some basic principles of ethical breeding. It is regarded as unethical to breed dogs that are known to: be epileptic; be dysplastic; have a wry mouth; be severely over—or undershot; have missing teeth; be monorchid; be badly mismarked. Again—these basic principles do not appear to apply in Beardies. People are breeding dogs known to be dysplastic or epileptic. Are the buyers of the offspring informed? What about buyers of the 3rd or 4th generation offspring that invest two or three years into the dog only to discover epilepsy or dysplasia? Other individuals are breeding wry—mouth to wry—mouth or monorchid to mis—mark merely to obtain puppies that will be pushed out into pet homes at six or seven weeks or age for anywhere from \$200 to \$400. A common theme among these breeders seems to be a vast number of bitches in the kennel in order to "pop—out" four, five, or more litters a year. The effects of this indiscriminate and unethical breeding are already apparent in the showring. It will be much more apparent in the future. The future of the breed is, to say the least, very questionable.

Understanding the Bearded Collie by Joan Blumire

One of the most perplexing questions potential exhibitors may ask of themselves is "when to begin training their Bearded Collie." In order to find the answer we may resort to delving into various canine books, only to find suggestions may vary from six to twelve months, or advocate waiting until total maturity. I think the reason for such a disparity of answers may lie in the meaning of "training."

The AKC and other official bodies have formed trials at which various working or structural components of the dog are studied during rigidly defined tests, the successful completion of which earns different titles. The owner therefore puts on collar and leash, takes the Beardie to conformation and/or obedience school and attempts to teach him to correctly perform certain tasks, and training has begun—or has it?

Let's take a broader look at the concept of "training" and attempt to define its meaning as it may apply to our needs. We may feel that training is "directing learning experiences toward required behaviour." It follows then that training can begin when the Beardie is capable of absorbing learning experiences.

To find the correct time this may occur let's retrace his life from the moment of birth. We can visualize the traumatic moments that led to his being roughly ejected from the warmth and safety of the womb to the dangerous outside world, and watch as his survival instincts send him fighting and struggling towards the life-sustaining mother's milk. We will see the satisfaction that follows his success, and realize to our dismay that his learning experiences have begun-he forgot to wait for us:

During the days that follow he will gain many experiencs through his senses of taste, smell and touch, and a whole new vista will open up to him as his eyes become able to focus on sights around him. Roughhousing and play between littermates is all designed to teach him to function as a future adult, and the time will soon come when he will be forced to leave his family and be introduced to strange new noises and smells and two-legged companions, and new pleasures and new restraints will be constantly thrust upon him. All through his life he will be continually experiencing all manner of pleasurable and unfavourable circumstances, and with each new occurrence he will be learning, whether or not we are aware of or intend it.

The hereditary makeup of our Beardie, coupled with his environmental conditions will directly affect both his behaviour, and his desire and ability to perform the tasks we wish. It would therefore be so much to our advantage if we could arrange his environment in every possible manner to be of maximum benefit for the future.

We have come to realize now I think, that there is no one month learning will begin, and no magic key to turn him on to learn only what we wish to teach him. Since he will be consistently learning, we will wish to use every opportunity to train him to learn the things we wish.

We certainly can't put a leash on a 6-week-old puppy and say "heel" but now we know this isn't what training is just about anyway! We can take a look at each stage of his life and see what he is capable of learning at that particular phase. We must be aware of the very limited

concentration span of a young puppy and not attempt to teach him things beyond his capabilities, but progress slowly and carefully step-by-step.

Training to be examined in the ring will first begin when we accustom him to being handled from his earliest days. A keen retrieve will be gained from the time we encourage an interest in rolling objects at a few weeks. A prompt recall will start when we call him in from the yard, perhaps with the aid of treats. Scenting abilities will be developed when we play hide and seek games. Thus we can use our imagination to think of all manner of tiny lessons that may be painlessly learned as a prelude to the days when he will be capable of performing the exercises exactly as required in the ring.

Time spent with a young puppy will be invaluable in getting to know and understand him, finding the strengths and weaknesses of his character, and helping him to form a happy and confident outlook, which will be a great future asset. Let us not neglect any time of our Beardie's life, for a day once lost can never be regained.

The All-Time Standings

The Bearded Collie in the United States has come a long way from those bewildering days in the early seventies when Beardie pioneers scurried about show rings in "rare breed" matches in the company of Lowchens, Shar-Peis and Greater Sennenhunden. Even in the (thankfully) brief sojourn through the miscellaneous class, it was aften less than a satisfying experience to find our dogs' merits compared to those of Ibizans and Australian Cattle Dogs. Finally, at the start of 1977, Beardies were given the opportunity to join in regular championship competition at AKC sanctioned shows.

The AKC championship competitive framework, however imperfect, has endured with little modification since the 1920s, and in more archaic forms since May 1877 when the sportsmen of the Westminster Kennel Club attracted 1177 entries to their first annual show in New York's Gilmore's Garden. Overall, Beardie fanciers have responded enthusiastically to championship competition, and through this exposure have earned for the Beardie new adherents and growing appreciation.

Periodically, reports appear in the Beardie Bulletin and Newsletter summarizing the results of the leading Bearded Collies in show competition. These are based upon official show results as published monthly in the AKC Gazette. As the Gazette only reports the results of individual dog shows, statistical compilation and summarization must be done to determine the overall standings. Diane Shannon (Arcadia) has kept these records and developed the summaries since Beardies have been in the show ring. In addition, sets of breed show statistics are independently maintained by Gail Miller (Gaymardon) and myself, so they can be occasionally checked with each other for accuracy.

The all-time Beardie show records as presented here are based on Diane Shannon's fouryear records, as checked out with her fellow record-keepers. Here are a few points about the way the standings are kept:

1. Monthly standings as they appear in the BCCA Newsletter are kept on a calendar

year basis. There is usually a 2-1/2 month lag between the dog show and the Gazette which includes shows through late August 1980. The all-time standings will be updated annually after the results of the full calendar year's shows have been published. The next next update should appear around May 1981.

- 2. Breed standings credit a dog for every Best of Breed won even if no other Beardies were entered. Thus, the "Dog in Competition" column which determines the dog's rank includes one point for the dog itself each time a BOB has been won. The BCB win is counted because the dog is still a live bonafide entry in the show, eligible for further competition in the Working Group.
- 3. Group Standings include all placements obtained by a dog in the Working Group. Best In Show awards are not counted as additional placements. In the "Dogs Defeated" column—which determines the rank—a dog gets credit for every dog shown in the Working Group that it is placed over, plus one for itself. (Note that the Canine Chronicle and Kennel Review group systems do not award the dog a point for itself.) If a dog wins a Group 3, it gets a point for every dog shown in every breed in the group except for the breeds whose winners have placed Group I and Group 2. Theoretically, the dog's placement means he has defeated all the dogs shown whose breed winners did not place or who placed lower. A Group I "defeats" all the those shown in the Working breeds, and a Best—in—Show "defeats" every dog in the show.

Despite the cross-checking done by the record-keepers, no claim of infallibility is made in keeping the breed statistics. Counting the dogs defeated in a working group placement is a challenge due to the size of the <u>Gazette</u> show record, type and layout. In addition, the <u>Gazette</u> frequently contains errors which are not corrected until later editions. <u>If you feel</u> that any statistics involving a dog of yours are inaccurate, please don't hesitate to write to <u>Diane or me</u>. But do give us the means to verify your figures, ideally by providing the shows' date and, if possible, the <u>Gazette</u> issues of the results in question. We want the show record data base to be as accurate as possible for future generations.

Now for a few comments about the all-time rankings:

- Ch. Brambledale Blue Bonnet and Ch. Ha'Penny Blue Blossom, #1 and #2 in Breed Competition and #2 and #3 in Group Competition are mother and daughter. Blossom is owned by my wife and me, and Bonnet, originally owned by Henrietta Lachman and me, was shown and is now owned by Robert and Henrietta Lachman.
- Ch. Shaggylane's Beaming Teak (#1 in Group and #4 in Breed), owned by Canada's Barbara Niddrie, has been shown in all four years of competition. His remarkable US record has been achieved despite his being primarily shown in Canada.
- Of the Breed Top 20, ten are American-bred, eight are English imports and two Canadian-bred. Only four are bitches.
- Of the 29 Group placers, fourteen are American-bred, fourteen are English imports and one is Canadian-bred.

- The kennel name most represented in both standings is Joyce Collis' Beagold, with three of her emigrants placing on the Breed and Group list. Of the Breed Top 20, Rich-lin and Silverleaf are represented twice. In addition, Jim and Diane Shannon and Ferd and Wendy Reinlieb each have two dogs represented (#5 and #9 owned by the Shannons, and #10 and #12 owned or formerly owned by the Reinliebs).
- Six kennel names are represented twice with group-placing dogs: Brambledale, Davealex, Edenborough, Gaymardon, Mistiburn, and Rich-lin.
