From the President

I think it's fair to say that the last two years must rank among the most turbulent in the BCCA's 16-year history. In spite of its well-publicized internal and external squabbles, the BCCA continues and, certainly on some levels, even prospers. It is perhaps too easy to overlook many of the club's positive, but less-publicized accomplishments. For instance, the Board's establishment of a herding committee and the resultant highly successful herding

certification program is a major milestone for the breed. Both HC awards and the new ROMI (Register of Merit for Herding Instinct) awards, administered by this committee, represent a giant step in the right direction toward maintaining and recognizing the breed's unique working abilities. The long-overdue rescue program is still in its infancy, but judging from the early enthusiastic and supportive response, it seems another major step.

Communications with local clubs has been improved by the initiation of the local club liason program utilizing regional contact people, and proposed motions for upcoming Board meetings are now being regularly sent to all local club secretaries to enhance their ability to participate more directly on a national level.

In the past two years, after establishing and approving the divisional setup for rotating the national specialty locations, the Club has held two highly successful specialties, both moneymakers, and has developed and instituted both a show guidelines manual and a supported show policy, providing trophies for best of breed and high scoring Beardie with a qualifying score in the regular obedience classes at two shows a year.

Additional items have been added to resale—including notepads and cards; two yearbooks have been put out; the JAMES BEARDIE COOKBOOK was published, all money—making items for the club, in addition to being simply nice items to own.

My hope for the BCCA's future is that the next few years will bring less controversy, and more commitment to the positive goals of communication and education. I know that some club members have been left at least temporarily drained and disillusioned by the seeming ineffectiveness of bureaucracy and its dictates. Happily, I also know that by and large the BCCA is blessed with an above-average pool of renewable human resources in its membership-certainly more than enough to help shore up any flagging spirits around.

As outgoing BCCA president, however, I want to caution you all about one thing I feel particularly strongly about: this is NOT a chicken-and-the-egg situation—the BCCA exists to serve the breed, NOT the other way around. To lose sight of this simple

fact is to lose sight of what our real priorities should be—the dogs themselves and working toward preserving the integrity of what we can ALL agree to is a splendid and very special breed.

Thanks to all who have been so supportive of me personally, and of the outgoing Board in general. Let's ALL work toward making the next year a banner one for Beardies...and the BCCA.

FORWARD...taking your dog with you

Kandy Robinson here again and it's just about the end of our 1984 year. It sure has been an exciting obedience year, especially for those of us who have put on new titles. There have been 28 C.D.'s, 4 C.D.X.'s, and 2 U.D.'s in this year so far. In this report I will have almost all the statistics for this year; if you have any additions or corrections to the list PLEASE write or call me and I will correct or add the information for the next Bulletin.

This has been a very busy time period for me as I have tried to accumulate all the obedience titled Beardies and their dates of titles for publication. I have received a few letters from you obedience "stronghearts" and I appreciate your support. The rest of the information came through researching years of Gazettes, 1974 to March 1985. Well, the list is compiled and will hopefully be published in the 1984 year-book. Again, if your dog's titles was inadvertently left out PLEASE write or call me, and again, I will correct the error.

One thing all this research has done is clear up A.K.C. and me about an "exclusive" Utility dog. I have reported in two other Bulletins a dog, "Beardie" named Saurie Scamper, U. D. who has been listed in two Gazettes as a "Beardie" with several high scores in Utility and Open and who was leading our Open and Utility statistics for this year. To make a long story short, the A.K.C. and I now agree that the Saurie Scamper, U. D. is NOT a "Beardie" but a Border Collie, incorrectly entered for several shows. (Did I hear a few sighs of relief from the South and West????) So I apologize for anyone put behind this dog, however, this time we all move UP.

The last issue, I promised that I would explain another of the obedience scoring systems this time and it's the "doozie". It's called the Shuman System and is used only to rate Open and Utility dogs. The points are accumulated by assigning a point value to a range of qualifying scores in Open and Utility. The system is as follows:

As you can see the more consistently the dog qualifies, the more points he accumulates. This system gives a fair rating to the higher degree dog in his own breed who may not be "a flashy exact" dog, but one who can compete and consistently qualify.

In conclusion I have a mixed note to add. I would like to congratulate Joan Blumire and Ch. Beagold's Black Tiffany, U.D. on acquiring that exclusive Utility title. I understand that Joan feels that this was Tiffany's final gift to her as Tiffany passed away shortly after. Congratulations for a job well done to Joan and her gone, but not ever forgotten, "special" Beardie!!!!

In The Good Old Summer Time!!!

Along with thoughts of outdoor summer shows, one should also think about our dogs' safety at these shows. Many of us camp for the week-end at shows.

I have had it happen that the gates are locked at midnight and not reopened til about 6:00 a.m., and no one is to be found in between to open them. What, then, does one do when a dog becomes sick during these times? Short of driving through these locked gates, what can a person do? What sort of things should a person carry in a "Doggie First Aid Kit"?

With this in mind, and knowing the vet was due for the yearly heartworm check of the clan, I asked my vet, Dr. F. J. McLaughlin of the Waterford Veterinary Hospital in Pontiac, Mi., for help and found him most willing and helpful. Between us, we suggest the following to be included in a waterproof container:

- 1. Scissors & tweezers.
- 2. Porous adhesive tape.
- 3. Roll gauze bandaging (for pressure bandage or dressing).
- 4. Cotton balls (cleaning ears, irrigating eyes, cleaning wounds).
- Eye wash Boric Acid- (for flushing irritated eyes or washing away foreign bodies from eyes-lids).
- 6. Thermometer (Normal temperature is 101-102 degrees. Don't forget to shake it down...leave in 45 sec.)
- 7. Pepto Bismol-liquid...l Tbl. spoon per 20# 3 times/ day. (I have used the Pepto tablets following the adult dosage for a 50# dog. Good for vomiting/diarrhea.)
- 8. Kaopectate- Canine preferred, but human can be used. For diarrhea.
- Mycitracin—Over the counter triple antibiotic ointment for abrasions and cuts.

10. Antibiotics—I like to travel with Tetracycline and Ampicillin....do not use except on advice of vet. If you do find yourself "fenced in" at a show some night, there is usually a phone to call for veterinarian advice. Not a bad idea to check on location of phones during daylight hours.

With the thought of summer shows also comes the thought of possible heat stroke. Dr. McLaughlin offers this advice:

Panting is a normal response to heat to help dogs maintain a steady body temperature. However, if heat stroke develops, panting will become more deliberate, gums become reddened and an increased heart rate is noticed. Rectal temperatures in excess of 105-107 degrees are frequently seen.

To prevent heat stroke when the outdoor temperatures rise, keep plenty of fresh water available at all times, insure adequate ventilation and shade for your animals. Avoid overcrowding, excitement and exercise. Never leave your dog in a closed car or van with the windows just open for air!!!!!!

Treatment for heat stroke should be initiated quickly and is directed toward lowering the body temperature. Submerge the patient in a tub of cold or iced water until the dog's temperature is down to 103 Don't overcool! Hosing the dog degrees. off will work fine if a tub isn't available. Wet towels will work much slower, but can be effective if the condition is Quick efforts will usually caught early. lead to successful reversal of the symptoms, but occasionally complications arise which require veterinary medical attention.

Electrolyte imbalences, brain swelling and/or disseminated intravascular coagulation occur in severe cases and proper medical treatment is needed immediately: but remember, recognizing the early symptoms and treating quickly will avoid any of these complications.

It would be a good idea to cut out and tape the above section on heat stroke in your grooming box. Also be sure you have towels available and cooler, well stocked with ice for your favorite beverages, could someday do a double duty and save a canine life. Another bit of advice is to spray the belly area on your dogs before you go in the ring, particularly between the back legs, with cool water.

Remember, when you put your dog in the crate in the shade of a tree, that shade can rapidly disappear. I have hit upon a fiberglass type netting, similar to what they use in Florida for green houses, to cover crates at a show and in the car while travelling. It is very porous and allows good air circulation, yet blocks out the sun very well. It comes in rolls and is five feet wide. I also use it to cover my kennel runs at home. I sewed seatbelt type material on the ends to prevent ravelling and fastened it to the chain link by means of the spring type holders one uses to keep an ironing board cover in place. An S type hook and a spring will work too. It drops the temperature in the runs about twenty degrees on a hot day. The material comes in white and dark grey. The dark grey seems to work best.

Another word of warning: if for some reason, you have to shave down a long-haired dog for the summer, leave an inch or so of hair on top of his back. This prevents damage by the sun to his vital organs.

Here's to fun and safe summer shows!

I have been attending dog shows since I was about 2 feet high, but my experience in the J. S. ring is limited as compared to the breed ring. "...Too often, the showmanship ring becomes the O.K. Corral with the Junior and the judge engaged in a showdown to see if the former (Junior) can be "caught" on the same side of the dog as the latter (judge). is almost comic to see a judge weaving a serpentine down the line of dogs as fast as he or she can, and to see the Juniors hurdling their dogs to avoid being "caught." This is not handling, this is not even close. The dog's appearance is never considered. The only thing which seems to matter is whether or not the dogs move while the judge and Junior are engaged in these "gymnastics"..."

It was particularly interesting to me--not because of my rather limited J. S. experience but because of my longer term of breed ring experience among top professional handlers. I can firmly state, THEY do not play the "O. K. Corral" game, nor do I believe the judges wish them to. It seems to be a game plan reserved for J. S. alone and encouraged by ALL J. S. books. Perhaps it's simply reached a point of ridiculousness?

The Versatile Herding Beardie

We are very lucky to have Bearded Collies. From a herding standpoint, we have something for everyone. Unlike Border Collies (that have just one - strong eyed - style of herding to choose) and unlike Australian Shepherds (that don't have clearly defined styles) we have two clearly defined styles of herding Beardie within our breed. If one doesn't suit one's needs, the other surely will.

Few farms in Britain have just sheep or just cattle - most have a few thousand sheep, maybe a few hundred cows or hogs, with some geese, ducks or chickens about the place. As a result, the Bearded Collie is capable of working all sorts of stock - from "hunting" sheep down from the mountains to driving cattle down a lane to penning the fat goose for Christmas dinner!

The two styles, Huntaways and Strong-eved. are by no means clearly defined in a Beardie just starting to work. The huntaway is usually very noisy, keeping up a vigorous barking as it runs. The strongeyed dog may be totally silent, using some "eye" , or be very free moving. The term "strong-eyed"is something of a misnomer. since very few Beardies have as strong an eye as a Border Collie, for example. While the Border Collie was bred for strength of eye which is so flashy for trials, the Bearded Collie remained a practical farmer's helper, not as classy to watch but very functional. It is most interesting that Border Collie breeders have now recognized that a lot of eye is a detriment in a functional dog and are now breeding upstanding, moderate-eyed herders--just like the Bearded Collie! Most "strong-eyed" Beardies have enough "eye" to keep their head in the right direction, but not so much as to cause them to crawl about on their bellies or stick up and refuse to come on to their sheep.

Herding ability is inherited and as we see dogs being certified on style we should soon be able to draw some conclusions as to what particular herding traits are dominant. Thus far, just from this writer's personal observations, it would appear that "eye" is dominant to a "huntaway" style. This is also true in other breeds. The vast majority of Beardies are fetching or gathering dogs, and it is my feeling that probably 100% would be if they were properly physically conditioned and not inhibited (as a few are by lack of socialization, poor temperament or obedience training by harsh methods).

Will a huntaway to huntaway cross produce a litter of huntaways? We hope to know more in the next few years. Clearly there is a need for dogs of both styles in the ranching community—to be able to predict the styles of the puppies would be a great aid to selling dogs to the right homes.

Many ranchers prefer a huntaway for their A mountainous or heavy unique terrain. brush range situation demands a huntaway type of dog, and it is here that the Border Collie (the most popular farm dog) has not met the need. Likewise, some ranchers like the strong-eyed Beardie for its easy moving style coupled with its less intense herding desire (most Beardies are not obsessive about herding and will quit when you tell them to instead of creeping off when your In addition, the Beardie back is turned). is rarely predatory toward the stock--most love the new lambs and spend as much time washing their faces and nuzzling them as their mothers do! And most are protective of their flock--once they work a group of animals they are theirs!

The Bearded Collie is truly a versatile, exciting herder, and can work big flocks of sheep, aggressive cattle, sensitive milk goats and flighty ducks. For the Beardie, being a "jack of all trades" is all in a day's work!
