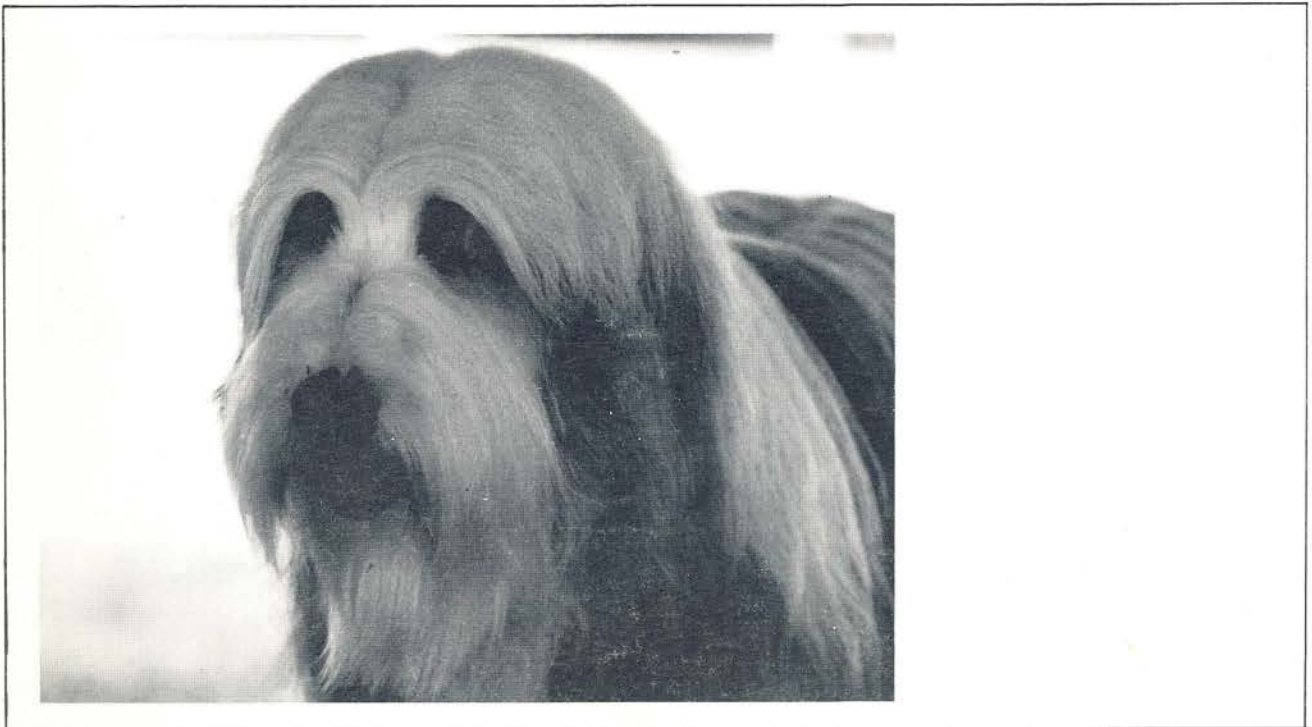

## Our Cover . . .

Ch. Ha'Penny Blue Blossom currently reigns as America's top winning Bearded Collie in 1979 breed competition. As of the November AKC Gazette, judges had placed Blossom over almost twice the number of Beardies as the next leading winner.

In 1972 we chose Blossom's dam, Ch. Brambledale Blue Bonnet, from her litter in England under the experienced eye of Brambledale breeder Lynne Evans. Bonnet served well as the original Ha'Penny foundation bitch, producing three Ha'Penny champions, including Blue Blossom. Blossom was sired by Barbara Blake's Ch. Brambledale Boz.

Blossom has developed into a striking group winner, who draws appreciative attention from judges, exhibitors and spectators alike. Through November she has been awarded 95 Bests of Breeds, with 16 group placements.

Other branches of Blossom's family tree have also bloomed. Last summer while Blossom was winning BOB at the prestigious Santa Barbara KC show, her young daughter Ch. Ha'Penny Blue Sasha went BOW to complete her championship. Later Blossom's sister, Ch. Ha'Penny Lucy Locket finished her championship unbeaten in the classes.

Blossom has also won many friends for the breed through the Kal Kan advertising campaign which has appeared in TV Guide, Better Homes and Gardens, McCalls, Ladies Home Journal, Redbook, Family Circle, Woman's Day and many daily newspapers. Show business notwithstanding, Blossom remains foremost our devoted family companion.

# For Your Information . . .

The following is an excerpt from an article by Pat Robertson, submitted by Anne Dolan:

## TRAINING DO'S AND DON'TS

- DO (1) Play with your puppy. Toss him a rubber ball, and use the same ball each session, so he'll know it belongs to him
- (2) Set some boundaries on his living habits. Let him know what's bad or good.
- (3) Praise or correct him instantly and consistently
- (4) Work with him daily and give him some time to learn
- (5) Keep your commands simple.
- (6) Keep his enthusiasm up and always leave him wanting more.
- (7) So Stop every training session on a good note.
- (1) Be afraid to correct him
- (2) Throw sticks and pine cones for him
- (3) Send him to retrieve unless there's something for him to bring back
- (4) Send him when he's looking in the wrong direction
- (5) Get in a hurry and lose your temper
- (6) Overtrain him

Doesn't this make sense no matter what your dog is being trained for? Seems like a lesson in common sense and fair play.

Also from Anne is the following "Report from the Education Committee":

In the next few months we will be asking for volunteers to keep in the various areas of Education. We have already received offers from members in both the US and Canada, and I would like to say a warm thank you.

The goals of an active Education Committee are simply to offer information on our breed to anyone who is interested. In the next year I would like to try to establish a library of films which could be made available to local clubs and individuals for a nominal fee. If any member owns a film (whether it's Crufts in years gone by, or a championship show, or simply a film of working Beardies) and you would be willing to share it or have a copy made, please contact me.

There are so many areas of research which we can cover. If there's a problem which you feel you can help with, again, please share your ideas. I list a few areas which might stimulate suggestions from the membership--and please remember, these are simply suggestions:

1. study of breeding different color combinations such as blue to brown--why and why not?
2. a survey to achieve a general picture of average weights and heights in litters. This would involve weighing and measuring of pups at birth and weekly thereafter to establish growth patterns
3. study of fading pigment in adult dogs. How common is it?

4. studies of dogs which never pigment properly
5. the Beardedie with poor eating habits. Can we help?

## THE SERVICE WITH THE SERVICE

What does a successful stud owner do? Well, he runs a few ads on his male, collects a fee, oversees the breeding, provides a pedigree of his dog and signs the litter papers. Right? Right! But some people are reluctant to fulfill even these five minimum requirements. I believe a conscientious owner must provide considerable more.

Let's take it from step one. Anyone even considering standing a dog at public stud must first take time to learn what a good Beardie looks like. He must then be able to objectively look at his own dog to see if the dog is really among the elite. He must know the dog's pedigree--not just names, but strengths and weaknesses of each individual. By this and careful evaluation of every litter the dog sires, his owner should be able to decide which bitches are suitable mates, and if the dog warrants continued use as a stud.

Not only must the stud owner know these things, but he must apply them--to outside bitches as well as his own. He should be candid and if necessary firm with the bitch's owner if he feels that particular bitch should be bred elsewhere or not at all. It will cost him considerably more than one stud fee if his dog gets a reputation for sireing consistently poor quality. And believe me, everything bad will get blamed on the stud, whether it's his fault or not. It's hard enough to get good puppies from well-planned breedings without deliberately mismatching dogs for a few dollars gain.

The stud owner must safeguard the health of his dog. He must set a policy concerning health requirements for the bitches he accepts as well. Precautions to be considered are Brucellosis tests, vaginal cultures, and for further reaching results, perhaps a hip x-ray and eye exam for hereditary defects. The stud owner must require the same standard for his male.

In addition to evaluating the bitch and her compatability with the stud, the stud's owner must tactfully evaluate the bitch's owners. Are they aware of the care a litter will require? Will they be responsible about selling and standing behind their puppies? Will they be able to recognize and properly promote or place the best pups? If they get "stuck" with the puppies for a few months, will they resist the temptation to lower prices or sell the litter to a pet shop?

Once a bitch is accepted for breeding, the agreement should be put in writing with each party keeping a copy. While technically the stud fee is paid for the service and not for the guarantee of a litter, most owners feel a responsibility to offer a return service in case of a miss. In no circumstance should the stud fee be returned. What constitutes a litter (usually either one or two live puppies at anywhere from birth to eight weeks of age) should be spelled out. Also, it should be noted in the case of a miss, whether the same bitch must be returned at her next season or whether substitutions or rainchecks are permitted. Method of payment of the stud fee plus any special arrangements complete the contract. The fee is normally paid at the time of service.

The stud owner now takes over. He must provide safe and adequate facilities for the visiting bitch, and arrange to pick her up if she is shipped. He should be knowledgeable enough to recognize any health or temperament problems which make breeding unwise, and to predict and copy with any unusual behavior due to stress on the part of the bitch. It is imperative that he recognize the difference. He should make the bitch as comfortable yet secure as possible during her stay. Also he should keep the bitch for a resonable length of time. More than one bitch has been mis-mated before or after she visited the proper stud, with potentially disasterous effect to the litter.



Handling the mating is no small detail. It takes common sense and experience to avoid the many potential problems in this area. A competent manager and an experienced stud dog with proper training can accomplish a breeding for almost any bitch, but it is not always easy. It is important to know the bitch will not be hurt, abused, drugged or badly frightened during the procedure. When and how frequently to breed are additional decisions to be made. It is helpful if the stud owner can do vaginal smears at home to determine optimum breeding times without additional veterinary expense.

Shipping can be expensive and a nuisance if advance arrangements are not properly made. Since expenses are constantly rising, we have recently initiated a shipping allowance to be deducted from stud fees for our males. It would be advantageous to see if other kennels offer a similar policy.

Once the litter is a few days old, the stud owner should promptly sign a litter application form and return it to the bitch's owner. If he lives within reasonable distance, the stud owner should examine the litter. This is to help him plan future breedings, to evaluate the quality of the puppies, to advise the bitch's owner of care for the litter, and to be certain that the puppies are purebred and truly the result of the intended breeding. If this is impossible, he must rely upon the description supplied to him. If any puppies need to be destroyed, encourage it be done now, rather than waiting until it is painful for both the dam and the owners.

Perhaps the most useful service the stud owner can provide is help in evaluating the litter and referring buyers for the puppies. This alone can make a great difference in getting the right puppies placed in suitable homes at decent prices. Let's make it clear that this is a bonus, not a responsibility of the stud owner. At times no one has buyers, but often the owner of a popular stud has a waiting list for puppies which can be passed along from time to time. Also, the stud owner has seen previous litters by the same sire and is the most qualified person to predict how the puppies will develop.

A courteous, efficient stud owner can make breeding your bitch simple and worry-free, rather than an org ordeal. However, selection of a male is far too important to be determined solely by public relations. Select a stud dog carefully, then check out his owners. Once you are satisfied with both, turn the worries over to them and content yourself with your own portion of raising that beautiful litter of Beardies.

## LOST DOG

Losing a dog is a scary experience. I know because I just went through it. I placed a 9-month-old Bearded Collie, who jumped the fence at his new home and ran away. My experience of looking and finally getting him back has taught me several important points I'd like to share with you.

1. If you are placing an older dog, assume he may try to escape. Jeremy had never jumped the fences at my house so I did not prepare his new family for this possible possibility. I feel that for at least 21 days the chance of a new dog leaving should be planned for and guarded against. Take pictures of your dog the day he leaves to go to his new home. Make sure you have up-to-date photos of all the dogs in residence with you.



2. Make sure there is an I.D. tag on the buckle of the dog's collar at all times.
3. If the dog becomes lost, realize that no one can tell the difference between your "lost dog" and the neighborhood stray. Unless your dog is perceived as missing no one is going to check his I.D. collar or look in the lost and found column of the newspaper. It is only when your dog appears to be lost (dirty, frightened, skinny or injured) that someone may attempt to contact you. You must make people in the neighborhood where he was last seen aware of the loss of your dog.
4. Put up a flyer describing your dog on every telephone pole and street sign in a 10-block area from where he was last sighted. Place them in business establishments, schools, local humane societies and animal control facilities. Go from house to house and personally hand a flyer to each residence. This personal contact is very time-consuming and can be discouraging--after all, everyone does not like dogs! But it can pay off in the return of your dog.
5. Visit the pound and animal shelter personally each day or two. Do not depend on them to recognize your dog themselves.
6. Run an ad in the paper. DO NOT put "Bearded Collie" in the ad or on your flyer. People will picture a totally different type of dog than your Beardie.

Keep up hope! Dogs have been found months after they were lost. Jeremy was found 5 days after he disappeared and aside from being a little skinny was in excellent condition.

I fervently hope you never lose a dog, but if you do, these suggestions may help you find your friend.

P.S. Jeremy is back in his new home and getting along beautifully!

## THE PRICE OF SUCCESS

Many people dream of turning their pet into a show champion, but they soon awake to the reality of cost. Producing a champion is more than a labor of love; it also requires a heavy investment in capital, from \$500 to \$3000, depending upon how many shows it takes to amass the necessary 15 points. The money goes for entry fees, traveling and grooming expenses and paying for a professional dog handler.

Acquiring the services of a dog handler increases the chances of winning at shows. The handlers are expert at accentuating a dog's good points in the ring and obscuring its faults. The most sought-after handlers may charge \$20,000 or more for a year's "campaigning" with a dog, traveling from show to show. They may handle dozens of dogs at a time, building a lucrative practice.

Some exhibitors recoup their investment by running breeding establishments or stud services and charging fees commensurate with a dog's show record. But for many persons of modest means showing dogs is simply an addiction that drains financial resources and brings nothing in return but an array of ribbons, suitable for framing. They find themselves keeping up not with the Joneses but the Rockefellers. Serious exhibitors often maintain kennels of show dogs, have

substantial private incomes, and belong to upper-crust clubs that sponsor events in much the same spirit that medieval aristocrats hosted jousting tournaments. The Westchester (New York) Kennel Club, for example, holds a show each September on the grounds of a Hudson River estate, at which the club's 17 members--10 of them from Wall Street--preside in white trousers and blue blazers. The atmosphere of many fashionable shows, in face, demonstrates that the horsey set is also the doggie set.

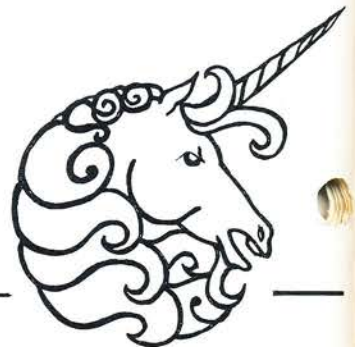

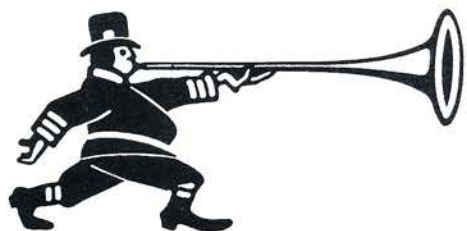

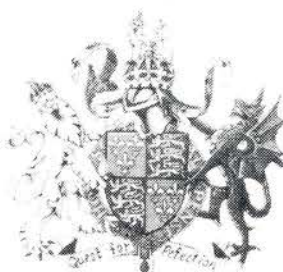
